Dear Governor Scott, President Gardiner, Speaker Crisafulli, and Chair Kuntz:

The Florida Council of 100 commends you for the development and "permanent" enactment of the State University System's performance-based funding model under House Bill 7029 (2016).

The old adage "what gets measured, gets done" holds as true for higher education as it does for businesses in the private sector. Add money into the equation, and one has a game-changer - a recipe for a strong system of incentives that can propel universities toward their goals of extraordinary access and achievement.

Optimally, a performance funding model should have several key components, including:

- Tightly aligning with the state's priorities for education, workforce development, and economic development. The guidance of the state's workforce and economic development plans is vital to ensuring that higher education meets the state's true educational attainment needs.
- Utilizing a clear but comprehensive set of metrics regarding access, progression, completion, and outcome. More specifically, performance indicators should include general outcome indicators (e.g., graduation rate, job placement rate), progress outcome indicators (e.g., number of students completing 60 semester credits), subgroup outcome indicators (e.g., Pell Grant recipients), and high-need subject outcome indicators (e.g., degree awarded in STEM fields). These indicators must be balanced in order to avoid perverse incentives such as rewarding the

- Reflecting and building upon institutional mission differentiation. Tailoring a few performance metrics to the specific missions of certain universities will prevent the model from impeding those missions.
- Bringing to bear enough funding to motivate institutional behavior. If not enough funding is at risk, institutional behavior is unlikely to change.
- Being regularly monitored to ensure that it is working as intended. Unexpected factors, such as a major economic recession, can impede the ability of the model to properly motivate institutional behavior. Additionally, the model might create perverse incentives whereby an institution's actions in response to the model might have negative effects on either the state or the institution, itself.

The State University System performance funding model adopted under House Bill 7029 demonstrates all of these characteristics – a product of a multi-year effort not just to develop a mechanism but, rather, a comprehensive system that balances a myriad of competing systemic and institutional factors.

The Council stands ready to help in any way necessary to further the success of Florida's postsecondary students and institutions. As business leaders, we know that the success of our firms and Florida's economy depends on having a top-notch workforce, and your creation and "permanent" codification of the State University System's performance-based funding model is a significant step in that direction.
